BCMS and State Legislators Grapple Together with Tough Questions for Building Healthier Communities

Physicians and legislators often go into our respective careers for many of the same reasons: to help people and communities to grow and to thrive. On Thursday, Feb. 18, the Boulder County Medical Society hosted our annual Legislative Forum, a lively discussion at the Boulder Country Club. Thirty-five BCMS physicians sat down to dinner with a panel of local members of our state legislature: Rep. Mike Foote (House District 12), Sen. Rollie Health (Senate District 18), Sen. Matt Jones (SD 17) and Rep. Jonathan Singer (HD 11). Three Colorado Medical Society staffers attended and provided excellent support: CEO Alfred Gilchrist, COO Dean Holzkamp and Program Manager Adrienne Abatamarco.

This year, after polling our BCMS membership to identify key concerns, we formally presented five tough questions to our panel, covering topics such as community stewardship, the Medicaid expansion, gun violence as a public health issue, mental health care, and the complexities of navigating our current health care and insurance landscape. Additional audience questions during the evening brought us into deep and meaningful discussion of the Amendment 69 “ColoradoCare” universal single payer proposal on the 2016 ballot, and exploration of end-of-life care and the politics surrounding patient autonomy in the dying process.

Our legislators generously engaged with us in thoughtful, collaborative discussion about how we can work together in meaningful ways to overcome limitations of law, resources and politics in order to build a healthier community, and everyone left the room with a deeper understanding of the issues, challenges and concerns our counterparts face. The realities of budgetary restrictions and partisan political divides remain challenging but the spirit of creativity, genuine curiosity and perseverance that our legislators bring to solving these challenges are encouraging as we in the trenches continue to care for patients within this complex health care landscape. The physicians and community of Boulder County are fortunate to have such a rich partnership with elected leaders who are truly committed to improving health throughout our community at every level.

CMS Opposes Insurance Mega-Mergers

Boulder County Medical Society has joined in wholeheartedly with the Colorado Medical Society's opposition to two massive proposed insurance company mergers: Aetna-Humana and Anthem-Cigna. In alignment with broader national efforts coordinated by the AMA, CMS recently [completed and published a survey](#) confirming widespread and deep opposition of CMS member physicians to the proposed mergers. Locally, several Boulder County physician practices have been invited to testify to the Department of Justice on the potential impact these proposed mergers could have on market competition, practice viability, patient safety and autonomy, and quality of care. Facing the Limits of Our Mortality: BCMS looks at legislation and community conversation around dignity and autonomy at the end of life

In January, a strong majority of BCMS members voted to support Colorado HB16-1054, the “Colorado End-of-Life Options Act” to create a legal process in Colorado, similar to what is currently in place in Oregon, for terminally ill patients who seek a dignified and autonomous conclusion of their dying process, to work openly and constructively with their health care team toward this end. While BCMS and individual member physicians did lend their support to this cause, the bill has ultimately “died in committee” again this year under partisan political pressures. Public opinion, political climate and health care culture continue to evolve, and BCMS will continue to support our members and the public in understanding the complexities of this issue, as it will likely remain on the legislative agenda or public ballot in coming seasons.

Last year, BCMS hosted a soiree event with Drs. David Hibbard and Charlie Hamlin, exploring the 2015 iteration of this bill in dynamic detail. This year, in 2016, look forward to a related discussion over the summer as a new upcoming soiree takes an in-depth look at “How Doctors Die Differently.”

Added Access to Care, or Costly Duplication of Services?

After a balmy January and February, the foot of glistening white stuff out my window reminds me it must be spring in Colorado. The bright sun (job security for our dermatologists?) is also a reminder that construction season will soon be upon us. In 2016, this means not only roadwork, but also the addition of several new massive medical infrastructure projects in Boulder County.

Toward the north of our County, University of Colorado Health continues to move ahead

with building a new full-scale hospital facility (UCHealth Longs Peak Hospital) to serve patients affiliated with what is now UCHealth Longmont Clinic, while Centura Health (which now owns Longmont United Hospital) continues to develop its own new network of outpatient feeder-affiliate primary care clinics and specialty offices. Currently, utilization of the existing Longmont United Hospital remains far below capacity, and demographic data from the realty world suggests that most of the population growth in the Longmont area is younger and demographically less likely to need or seek hospital-based services. It remains questionable whether northern Boulder County can sustain two hospitals, and to what extent empty beds and oversaturation with specialist practices may increase costs, drive unnecessary care and further fragment care for patients in the Longmont area.

Meanwhile, to the south, Boulder Community Health is moving ahead with its plans to convert the Community Medical Center Urgent Care in Lafayette to a free-standing ER. With numerous additional urgent care facilities nearby, five full hospitals in Boulder County (and 10 within a 25-mile radius around the county), and the uncertain regulatory and economic future of other current or future free-standing ERs throughout Colorado, this too has raised questions and community concerns.

In an era where advancing technologies, patient preferences and insurance reimbursement protocols are all driving care out of the hospital setting and back into the community, can local populations sustain this density of tertiary care facilities? How will these numerous competing hospital facilities affect the cost, quality, coordination and accessibility of care in our community?

I first met Dr. Mooney in an interview for a position at the Longmont Clinic in March of 1993. He and Chris invited me and Karen for coffee as we left town. In his usual forthright, honest and direct manner he made it clear that he thought me foolish joining a multiple specialty clinic. As an alternative he suggested that I join him.

The next time we met was in the doctor's lounge in the old Longmont United Hospital. He and some of the senior staff were discussing the problems with the destination of medicine in the face of advancing managed care. His thoughts had been well researched, thought out and organized, and presented in a clear manner.

Over the ensuing years we became fast friends. During our trips to the Denver Academy of Surgery we had many discussions about our profession, families and life in general. We developed a special bond.

Dr. Mooney was one of the most knowledgeable and thoughtful surgeons I have ever worked with. Tireless, honest, dedicated. His fund of knowledge was broad and for the most part current.

He will be missed by this community, colleagues, friends and fellow workers, but mostly by his patients. And me.
